UNFORTUNATE CHESS QUOTES

At the present day where social media have strong impact on our lives, Christmas and New Year's holidays seem to be a perfect period to have tons of joy and laughter on various chess topics that may be found on different SM channels. Thanks to chess literature, we can relate to similar hilarious statements from over a century ago, too.

While listening to the latest lamentable comments appearing in the news on chess, it occurred to me that a little historical perspective might be in order. Just think if some of these had the instant internet notoriety that today's have received. Morphy and Tarrasch may very well have quit chess out of embarrassment.

OLD BUT GOLD

"Paulsen shall never win a game of me while he lives." – Paul Morphy, after sitting through one of Paulsen's seemingly interminable thinking sessions, otherwise known as a chess game. Unfortunately, Morphy lost the very next game. (Source: Reinfeld, *The Human Side of Chess*)

Siegbert Tarrasch made a statement which later severely limited his conversations with Dr. Lasker in their 1908 match. He wouldn't shake hands with Lasker, stating, **"To you Herr Lasker, I have only three words to say: Check and Mate."** He lost 8-3 with 5 draws.

Along those lines of unfortunate predictive quotes, there is Sammy Reshevsky, "who was asked whether he expected to win the Western Chess Association Championship of 1933."

He responded with **"Who is there to beat me?"**

Well, Reuben Fine beat him by scoring 12 wins to 1 loss (to Reshevsky), but Reshevsky won 9 games and drew 4 to finish a point behind. (*Fireside Book* of Chess)

At the 1911 Carlsbad tournament Fyodor Duz-Khotimirsky jumped up from his game with Marshall, ran into the next room and burst out with **"Poor Marshall dead."**

He came back, along with everyone else, to see Marshall's move. He then wailed, **"Oh, Oh, Marshall not dead. I dead."**

"Why must I lose to this idiot?" – Aron Nimzowitsch, Baden-Baden 1925, jumped onto a table and shouted this memorable line, mostly silently shared by many other chess players after losing. *Wiener Schachzeitung* noted this about Nimzo: "...the kindest and nicest person imaginable, but for all that he should not overreact. It is really not necessary to overturn all the pieces at once, instead of giving his victorious opponent greater pleasure by resigning the game in proper fashion."

I must admit that a cell phone capturing that image of Nimzo on that table and going viral is just too delicious not to imagine.

MODERN ERA "PEARLS"

Our modern era, the 21st century, is off to a rousing start with these two:

"While it's true that Kasparov is almost as good at playing chess as my iPhone, he is otherwise an idiot." – Elon Musk, 2022.

Now, that is uncalled for. BTW, what version of the iPhone? Will it fit in my sock?

"Chess is not for women." – GM Ilya Smirin, live commentator on FIDE Women's Grand Prix 2022-23.

This received a Tone Deaf Award from the chess community, and Smirin may very well hold that title for the rest of the century. Of course, he can't match the immortal title holder.

The all-time champ, though, is none other than the *enfant terrible* of chess history – Robert J. Fischer. You youngsters may be unfamiliar with his *tour de force* in the Ginzberg interview in the June 1962 issue of *Harper's*. It was the motherload of unfortunate quotes:

However, Fischer was on a roll in that early interview. He pretty much ensured his not being invited back to class reunions with:

"My two and a half years in Erasmus High I wasted. I didn't like the whole thing. You have to mix with all those stupid kids. The teachers are even stupider than the kids...Half of them are crazy."

He must have had time, though, to take the Palmistry Science course at Erasmus:

"Palmistry is a definite science; it's not just a bunch of nonsense like astrology." Whew, thank God for that!

CHESS ENTERTAINMENT

Our popular U.S. champ, Fabiano Caruana, managed to pick an unfortunate word with which the tournament he won will forever be remembered by: The Disrespect Tournament.
