

The Communications team at US Chess undertook yeoman's work when we offered daily coverage of the 2023 World Chess Championship with three components: daily round reports by US Chess Digital Editor JJ Lang, elite annotations by the likes of Abrahamyan, Liang, Moradiabadi, Yoo, and Yu for each and every round, and — most importantly — daily, downloadable bulletins in pdf format, fully typeset and with photos, crosstables, etc.

Anyone who has worked in print knows how hard the details of print layout can be. Make one edit and the baselines shift. Photos need to be nipped and tucked. And don't even get me started on translating raw Chessbase files into Lichess studies *and* text suitable for Indesign.

Over the course of three weeks our team of titled annotators and our in-house staff led by JJ Lang and Natasha Roberts effectively wrote a book on the match, completely on the fly. The bulletins were available for anyone to download, anywhere in the world, the day after the game in question was played, with replayable versions on Lichess.

All completely free.
